The day of beauty was a treat for all of those involved. The Cosmetology students at South Tech take their state board exams as part of the class and gained valuable experience working with the Southview students.

"It's all about making others feel good," said Marquisha Terry, a student at South Tech and Kirkwood High School in the Kirkwood School District. "Today we are making them feel beautiful inside and out."

Southview students were able to choose what services they wanted to receive. Hair styling, makeup and manicures were all available.

South Tech's Cosmetology program allows students to learn in a full-service interactive salon and spa environment. They use their creativity to provide a wide range of hair, nail and skincare services. And they get to work with a professional cosmetologist while developing their own point of view.

"This is such a great experience for the South Tech students to work with kids from Southview," said South Tech teacher Jean Werner. "They come away from this day appreciating the opportunities that they have."

To help the Southview students prepare for their day of beauty, their teachers and paraprofessionals helped them search the Internet for hairstyles. And then they brought pictures with them to their stylists.

Kilia Summers, a student at South Tech and Maplewood-Richmond Heights High School, summed it up by saying that it was exciting to help the students feel extra special for their prom.

"We were happy to help them prepare for prom and hope they had a lot of fun," said Summers. ■





Neuwoehner High School

EARNs NATIONAL SCHOOL OF CHARACTER HONOR

The Character Education Partnership has named SSD's Neuwoehner High School as a 2014 National School of Character.



Neuwoehner is one of 41 schools and three school districts being recognized nationwide in 2014. It is the only one of 10 schools and two school districts honored this year in the St. Louis metropolitan region that serves an entirely special education population.

Each year, CEP selects schools and districts that demonstrate through a rigorous evaluation process that their focus on character development has had a positive impact on academic achievement, student behavior, and school climate. Selected schools will serve as models for other schools, helping them to achieve the same results.

Service projects, guest speakers, monthly focus on individual character traits and bullying prevention activities are all key elements of Neuwoehner's character education efforts.

Earlier this year, Neuwoehner was among eight schools and two school districts from the St. Louis metropolitan region to earn distinction as a 2014 Missouri School of Character before advancing to the national level for review.

Neuwoehner is the second SSD school to recently receive recognition as a National School of Character. Northview High School earned the honor in 2012.

CEP will honor the 2014 National Schools of Character at the National Forum on Character Education, to be held the weekend of Oct. 30, 2014, in Washington, D.C. For more information about CEP and the National Schools of Character program, visit www.character.org. ■
