SSD's Parent Education and Diversity Awareness Program, along with the SSD Transition Department, is working to support families through this planning process with a series of workshops that will focus on transition.

## Transition to Adult Life Resource Fair

Tuesday, Oct. 17, 4-7 p.m., SSD Central Office, Rooms 60-61

This resource fair will provide families with information and support as their children transition to adult life.

Additional workshops will also be held throughout the school year that will focus on important steps of the transition process, including college preparation, benefits and estate planning, supports from community agencies including Regional Office and Vocational Rehabilitation, self-determination and more.

## IEP Family Survey

Families of students that receive services from SSD and have provided SSD with their email address will receive an electronic request to complete an Individualized Education Program (IEP) survey. The surveys will be sent out after your student's annual IEP or initial IEP. Responses will be used to improve the IEP meeting process countywide and will not be shared with your child's IEP team. The survey should take no more than five to 10 minutes to complete. Survey results will be shared in next semester's Parent Connection newsletter.

This training is designed to teach parents, family members, caregivers, teachers, school staff, peers, neighbors, health and human services workers, and other caring citizens how to help an adolescent (age 12-18) who is experiencing a mental health or addictions challenge or is in crisis. Youth Mental Health First Aid is primarily designed for adults who regularly interact with young people. The course introduces common mental health challenges for youth, reviews typical adolescent development, and teaches a five-step action plan for how to help young people in both crisis and non-crisis situations. Topics covered include anxiety, depression, substance use, disorders in which psychosis may occur, disruptive behavior disorders (including AD/HD), and eating disorders. CEUs are available through Behavioral Health Response.

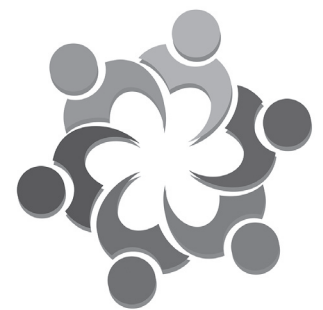
